Key Messages

Effective communication is needed to convince decision-makers that:

- Public health preparedness is a core component of public safety.
- The PHEP Program protects the health, safety, and security of American lives.
- Through the PHEP Program, we have had success responding to numerous events.
- The PHEP Program has been cut by 42% since 9/11 resulting in the following impact in our community.

About the PHEP Program

- The PHEP Program, managed by the Division of State and Local Readiness (DSLR) within the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention/Office of Public Health Preparedness and Response, allows our nation to invest in the critical public health resources that contribute to our overall national security.
- The PHEP Program administers funds for preparedness activities to 62 state, local, and territorial public health department awardees through the PHEP cooperative agreement.
- State and local public health departments supported by the PHEP Program are uniquely positioned as the first line of defense as responders, outbreak investigators, and agents of recovery.
- Investing in public health preparedness before an emergency occurs saves lives and reduces the cost of responses.

The Challenge

- Since 9/11, critical preparedness funding has declined by 42%.
- Cuts to PHEP Program funding have forced PHEP Program awardees to cut specialized positions, staff trainings and exercises, and equipment.
- A lack of continued, stable, and adequate funding directly diminishes state and local health department capacity to prepare for and respond to emergency threats in the communities they serve.
- Describe how PHEP Program funding cuts impact your jurisdiction's ability to deliver critical public health and safety functions (e.g, biosurveillance, countermeasures & mitigation, incident management, community resilience, information management, surge management).

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The Opportunity

- Now is the time to renew the federal commitment to state and local public health departments responsible for safeguarding the public's health.
- PHEP Program funding must be maintained to continue advancing our nation's health security.
- Describe how PHEP Program funding would help keep your community safe (e.g., vulnerable population preparedness planning, rebuild capability/capacity lost, fill surge capacity gap).

Public Health Emergency Preparedness Fund

- In a public health emergency, the speed of response is critical.
- In the last decade alone, we have faced serious threats from H1N1 in 2009, MERS in 2012, Ebola in 2014-2015, and now currently, Zika.
- The Federal Emergency Preparedness Fund would be a dedicated reserve-funding stream that would enable our nation to rapidly contain and eradicate emerging threats and save lives.
- Supporting this fund is not only an urgent public health concern, but also a matter of national health security.
